Public Domain Archive could not be fully verified as a currently reliable stock-photo resource; historically it focused on a public-domain-oriented image archive whose root currently resolves. The original list described it this way: “Everything you need for creative projects, updated weekly.”

Best uses

Public Domain Archive is most relevant for historical or public-domain image research when provenance can be independently verified. Search by the subject, orientation, visual style, and required output size rather than choosing an image only because it is free.

Licensing and commercial-use considerations

The root domain responded during review, while another retrieval returned a 404. Treat availability as inconsistent and verify both the rights statement and original source for every image.
